Savings	Money that you have saved, usually in a bank.	Students will learn how to manage complex financial documents, such as payslips, tax codes, and credit card statements, to understand how gross pay is transformed into net income. Students will develop the practical skills required to create and maintain a personal budget, effectively balancing essential living costs against savings goals and discretionary spending. Students will understand the long-term implications of different types of debt, including the impact of interest rates and credit scores on their future ability to secure loans or mortgages.	Create a poster, PowerPoint, mindmap, report, animation or video about: 1. The difference between savings and current accounts. 2. When is it good interest vs bad interest. 3. What is payslip and tax?
Interest	The money you earn from keeping your money in a bank account. The extra money that you must pay to a bank, company, etc which has lent you money.		
Payslip	A piece of paper given to an employee to show how much they have earned and any deductions (= amounts taken off for income tax, etc.) in a particular period.		
Budget	A personal budget or home budget is a finance plan that allocates future personal income towards expenses, savings and debt repayment.		
National Insurance	National Insurance is a compulsory payment made by employees. It provides assistance for people who are sick, unemployed or retired (the State Pension).		
Investment	The money that you put in a bank, business, etc in order to make a profit, or the act of doing this.

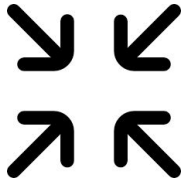

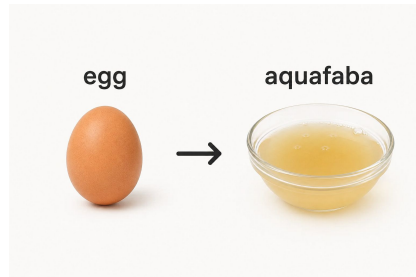

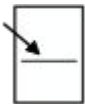

Modify	To change a recipe to make it healthier or suitable for people with special diets.	Desserts use different cooking techniques like baking, whisking and melting chocolate. Ingredients such as eggs, cream and chocolate help change the texture of desserts and aquafaba can be used instead of eggs in vegan recipes. Desserts from around the world can have different flavours and textures. Presentation and decoration make desserts look more appealing.	 Choose a dessert from anywhere in the world and find out: - What ingredients are used - What cooking techniques are needed (e.g. baking, whisking, folding) - What the dessert tastes or feels like (e.g. creamy, crunchy, soft)  Create a labelled drawing, mini poster, or recipe card showing the dessert and how it would be presented.
Aquafaba	The liquid from a can of chickpeas. It can be whipped and used instead of eggs in vegan desserts.		
From Scratch	Making a dessert using basic ingredients instead of ready-made mixes.		
Dietary Restrictions	Foods that some people cannot eat or choose not to eat because of allergies, health needs, religion, or lifestyle choices.		
Presentation	How a dessert looks when it is served and decorated.		
Technique	A special cooking skill used to make food, such as folding, whisking, or baking.

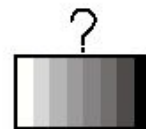

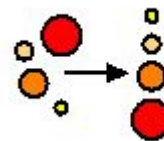
