

Speech and Language Therapy at Home #5

Did you know...

Students with language disorder can find it more difficult to tell stories with a clear beginning, middle and end. It can be hard to remember all the details they want to say, and to organise their ideas in the right order.





Practicing storytelling helps to develop narrative and sequencing skills, making it easier for students to use these in real-life situations.

For example: telling a friend about something funny they saw, or telling an adult about something they have witnessed in a clear way.

Activities to do with your child:

Keep it simple: Sequencing Ask your child to tell you how to make something, putting each step in

the right order. -

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Right on track: Favourite Story Ask your child to tell you about their




Sheet 1: Sequencing

Look at the pictures. Support your child to think about what happens **first**, next, after that etc. Once they have it in order, ask them to tell you all the steps.






Ask your child to tell you about their favourite movie or book using the story planner. \notin them 5 minutes to write on or look at the story planner, then ask them to tell you the story. Point at parts of the planner to remind them to include information e.g. point at 'where?' to remind them to tell you where the story is set.





Activity 3: Comic Strip

Your child can create their own comic strip - choose a character, think of an adventure they will have, some events that will happen, then a good ending. Ask them to tell you the story when it is finished. These templates can easily be drawn on paper at home for more practice!
